Joan wanted to highlight this role to demonstrate how Secular Franciscans make a meaningful difference both through Church ministries and in the broader world.

A Word from Our Minister...

As December began there was an air of expectancy, anticipation, excitement, and joyfulness. Our family has held the tradition of the (Advent) Jesse Tree since my oldest grandson was three-and-a-half years old. It won't be quite the same next year as he'll be going off to college in the fall, destination yet unknown. So, it's a different kind of longing, hopefulness, and savoring. The prayers and handmade symbols are very unique. We all look forward to clearing the table after dinner to light the Advent candles, read the Scriptures, and say the prayers each evening. We've pondered and discussed the many aspects of what it must have been like for a pregnant Mary and worrying Joseph to journey over rough terrain for seeming endless days and nights only to reach Bethlehem and find no inn to deliver the baby Jesus. The Incarnation is the greatest event in all of history. Time is measured as BC, Before Christ, and AD, After Christ's birth. It is the greatest love story of all time. John 3:16 "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life."

In keeping with the tradition of the Jesse Tree, it was also time to bring out my photographs of Greccio. I had the distinct pleasure of visiting this remarkable little town during one of Sister Agnes Marie's Assisi pilgrimages. As you're pulling into the parking lot, what initially catches your attention is the fact the village was carved into the side of a mountain. Then you begin to wonder how you're going to get up there. As your eyes follow the stone wall, you see a lovely statue of St. Francis, then you focus on the towering stone stairway that leads to the monastic complex of Greccio up above. It is composed of a sanctuary, known as the hermitage, that contains the original chapel, a church, and in its crypt, there are preserved frescos from the 14th century and the nativity scene. There in an adjacent room are displayed creches from around the world, from the simplest to the very ornate renderings of the nativity. It is amazing to see how the most basic materials are utilized to create a work of spiritual art next to ornate and hand-carved models. Each inspires a sense of awe and wonder. As we entered the church, there was a life-sized tableau of the nativity. I could have spent the day sitting in front of this life-like creche just feeling the experience of the story of the first Christmas. We celebrated Mass in the church and its uniqueness remains with me still.

Last year, the whole Franciscan family focused on celebrating the fivehundred-year anniversary of St. Francis' reenactment of the birth of Jesus in Greccio, Italy: bringing to life Francis' visualization of Jesus' birth. He made it feel real to all who witnessed it. God became man in the form of a tiny baby and changed the world forever, bringing love and hope to a longing world.

May the Lord bless you and your families and grant you joy, peace, and happiness this Christmas season.

The Incarnation



The Formation Corner

At the Mass I attended on Christmas day, I was struck by the first reading from Isaiah. It begins with a message that glad tidings of salvation are coming to Zion, and then goes on to say that, even as the sentinels announce the arrival of the messenger, the "Lord [is] restoring Zion."

I thought, "What does restore mean?" Lo and behold, when I looked it up, the second definition had a wonderfully familiar word to us Franciscans: *repair or renovate (a building, work of art, vehicle, etc.) so as to return it to its original condition*. OK, I might have gotten just a little bit excited about this. In order to let this idea gel a little,

On Thursday, as I was about to pray Psalm 128 in the Liturgy of the Hours (Vol IV, page 1128), I came to the line, "May the Lord bless you from Zion all the days of your life." Just above this Psalm was a quote from Arnobius that Zion refers to the Church.

When I put Isaiah, Christmas, and Arnobius together, what emerged was that God was rebuilding the Church through His Son. Now this statement needs some clarification. To that end, let's look at the word Church.

Now we must return to our Jewish roots. This takes us to the Hebrew word *qahal*, which means *assembly*. To put this in some kind of context: on Ash Wednesday, if we were to read the first reading from the prophet Joel in Hebrew, it would be very familiar to us when we read *proclaim a fast, call an assembly* (qahal). From Hebrew, we go to Greek for the same word, which is *ekklesia*, then to Latin (ecclesia), then to Germanic/Saxon (kirke), then to modern English (Church). This makes sense when we understand the Church to be the people of God and not a mere structure, no matter how humble (like San Damiano) or grand (like Notre Dame cathedral) it may be.

Where am I going with this?

When St. Francis was praying in that little run-down church of San Damiano more than 800 years ago, he was told to "go rebuild My house," that is the Church (FA:ED, Vol II, page 249). At first, as we know, he took the instruction literally, but gradually came to understand its deeper meaning. In other words, he heard and responded; he was obedient. For those of us to are called to "follow in the footsteps of Saint Francis of Assisi" (Rule, article 1), we are also called to rebuild the Church.

To return to the Christmas Mass reading, God wants His Church, his assembly, his people, to be restored. We are called to that mission. In this way, we become active participants in the ongoing work of "redemptive obedience" (Rule, article 10). It is the path to life.

I am reminded of the story from a few years ago when the Holy Father spoke with Tibor Kauser, our Minister General. He said to Tibor, "You are the head of the largest Order in the Church. Where are you?" I don't know what Tibor answered, but I know what my answer would have been in light of our mandate to rebuild/restore the Church. At the risk of sounding cheeky, I would have responded with the question, "Holy Father, where are you looking for us? If you're looking for us in ivory towers and cathedrals, you might find a very select few of us there, but you're likelier to find us working in soup kitchens or food pantries, in nursing homes or hospitals, in schools, in parishes, or wherever there is a need. That is where Christ would have been; that is where St. Francis would have been; and that is where we are now. It is where we are called to rebuild the Church.

In the entryway of the building the bulletin board was filled with residents' thoughts for what they were thankful. Common among the notes were "for waking up," "for


having a place to live" and "for having each other." One resident, evidently a suffering servant, was thankful for the Cubs and Bears.
