

On March 16, the 2nd Sunday of Lent, Fr. Bartholomew Okorie preached a homily largely based on the reading from Genesis 15. This is when God told Abram to "count the start if you can." I offer my reflections on the homily.

Fr. Bartholomew talked about Hollywood stars. They are people who tend to want the light to shine only on themselves. This contrasts to a cosmic star where the light is radiated away from itself. If the star's light would be turned inward, it would become a black hole and would suck everything close to it into itself, that is, into oblivion.

The question is: what kind of stars are we? Are we positive, hopeful people who radiate that "light" outward? Or are we "black holes" whose light implodes into a black hole and tries to draw others into the oblivion of our own misery?

This got me to thinking about St. Francis when he returned home after his year-long captivity and illness in Perugia. His light was imploding inward, and no one seemed to understand. His friends tried to lure him back into the party boy he had been before he left Assisi. They more or less gave up on him at some point by saying that he was "in love." He wandered around rural Assisi knowing that things weren't right, that he wasn't right, but the answers just wouldn't come. Then four things happened.

First, he thought that maybe he could resurrect his dream of knighthood by joining Walter of Brienne on a crusade, but a vision in the night asked him whether the master of the servant could do more for him. He answered that the master could, of course. The voice in the vision told him to go back home, so he did.

Second, when Francis was praying in the decrepit church of San Damiano, a voice instructed him to "rebuild my church." He obeyed by begging stones from others to rebuild the tumbledown church – taking the command literally.

Third, Francis, who was known to go far out of his way to avoid a leper, got down off his high horse, as it were, gave the leper he encountered a few coins, and kissed his hand.

Finally, Francis faced his angry father Pietro in the town square. Pietro demanded that the bishop make Francis return all of the goods he had taken or at least repay him. At this point, Francis returned everything that belonged to his father, including the clothes he was wearing. Francis then declared that Pietro was no longer his father, but that he could truly say that God was his father. That must have been quite the spectacle!

Do you see the progression from turning the light inward like a Hollywood star to radiating outward like a cosmic star?

Lent is the time for us to evaluate what kind of "stars" we are. Does our light radiate outward to give others peace, love, and joy? Or does it turn inward and drag others into our darkness? This is the time to practice turning our love outward for the good of others so that it becomes a kind of resurrection for us and for others.
